


PART 1. WHY DO PEOPLE MIGRATE?

- Forced migration
 - refers to the coerced movement of a person or persons away from their home or home region. Migrating in the same country means the person is an Internally Displaced Person (or IDP)

- What are some push and pull factors?




PUSH AND PULL FACTORS




IMMICRATION TO THE US 1880-1930





IMMICRATION TO THE US 1930-1965






IMMIGRATION TO THE US 1965-2000
